Foundation Receives Grant From USDA

USDA Rural Development has granted the Fort New Salem Foundation, Inc. \$56,650 to install a drainage system at Fort New Salem.

The drainage system will consist of French drains around each of the buildings that will be tied into a central line to funnel the water off-site. Drains will also be installed around the perimeter of the parking lot to prevent water that comes off the surrounding hills from flowing across the lot, through the grounds and under the buildings. This drainage system will help to insure the preservation of one of the Fort's primary assets, its historic log structures.

The grant funds became available nationwide to counties that had been declared national disaster areas due to the recent flooding. The funds are to be used to encourage business

development in these areas. The Fort became aware of the availability of the funds due to a call that came to Terry Schulte at the Harrison County Planning / Landmark Commission, where board member Becky Nesbitt works. Several projects at the Fort were considered. Cheryl Wolfe, Program Director - Rural Business and Cooperative Programs of the West Virginia office of the USDA, visited the Fort and suggested that the drainage plan stood the best chance of being funded. The grant application was then completed and submitted. Thanks to former director Tim Brady and board members Mark Kiger and Stephen Kelly for their great assistance in getting the right information to Becky for the grant application.

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18th Annual Dulcimer Festival Held At Fort

What a spectacular weekend for the 18th Annual Dulcimer Festival at Fort New Salem!! Dulcimer players from all over the eastern seaboard gathered on Friday, August 8 to participate in this three day event that was planned by Dr. Linda Sigismondi. Linda has organized this event since its inception—in fact, it was her idea to hold this festival at the Fort starting in 1991.

Friday evening began with tents being pitched, campers being parked, old friends greeting each other, new friends being made. The sounds of dulcimers, both hammered and mountain—as well as many other instruments—rang against the surrounding hills as folks gathered on the porch of the Basket shop for the first concert

of the weekend. The music continued into the late hours of the evening throughout the jam session that continued in the Basket Shop. The unusually cool evening (for August) brought out sweaters for most.

As Saturday dawned, people streamed into the Fort to take part in the many wonderful workshops organized by Linda and taught by some of the finest leaders anywhere. There were classes in all levels and types of dulcimer playing. There were also classes in tin whistle, bowed psaltery, reading music, etc. For the first time in 18 years, this writer was able to take some of these classes and one day hopes to be able to actually play some of these instruments.

Saturday evening brought one of the finest concerts to the Fort that the Dulcimer Festival has ever had. The mountain dulcimer player, Shelly Stevens, delighted the audience with her performance, showing the various styles of music this instrument is capable of producing. She also sang some very entertaining songs. Stephen Humphries, the featured hammered dulcimer performer, is the 2007 National Hammered Dulcimer champion (who would have thought there was such a thing!). He proved why he's champion, with a most fantastic performance on this somewhat daunting-looking instrument. The cd's he had flew off the sales table and into the hands of very

satisfied paying customers—this writer included! One audience member said there was only one thing wrong with the concert—it wasn't near long enough!!


Sunday opened with the Traditional Song Circle. Bleary-eyed dulcimer players (the late night jam session ended somewhere around 2 in the morning—or later for some) gathered in the central green of the Fort and played a mix of traditional songs and old-time hymns. The late morning and early afternoon saw a continuation of fine workshops, mostly for more advanced players than this writer (which would be about anyone). The afternoon closed with a

festival favorite—the ending jam session, concluding with the annual singing of John' Denver's "Country Roads". Tents were then packed, campers hooked to trucks, hugs all around to old and new friends alike and plans started for next year's Dulcimer Festival at Fort New Salem.

The storehouse was demolished earlier this summer to make way for a future visitors' center.
